

## Municipal Election 2018 (Survey Results): Town of Ingersoll

Poverty negatively impacts our ability to create a healthy, vibrant community. The fact that some people in Oxford County cannot afford basic needs, including nutritious and sufficient food is a real concern. In Oxford County, based on the 2015 after tax Low Income Measure, 10.8% of the population (11, 835 people) live in low income.

On September 10, 2018, all Town of Ingersoll Candidates were contacted via email with a follow-up call and provided an introduction to, and a link to the following survey. The survey questions provide an opportunity for voters to start a discussion with candidates about poverty reduction. Our hope is that this survey serves as a starting point to an ongoing conversation about poverty in Oxford County.

Participation in the survey was voluntary. Responses provided by the candidates that completed the survey are posted and have not been changed in any way. Social Planning Council Oxford would like to thank those candidates who have completed the survey.

Tammy Jeffrey- Larder	Councillor	Yes	We need to work together to find opportunities to support our community. The strategic plan needs to updated so we have a focused approach on all the important needs of our community
Gordon Lesser	Councillor	Yes	Through either the town helping to reduce our costs to a developer or offering assistance and support for county and provincial incentives to developers. I have also discussed this with other councillors and keep an eye on what other municipalities are doing to see if there is a innovative idea that we can use. The other avenue is to keep this front and center provincially. Hopefully with enough pressure there will be new or better incentives for developers.

Eric Berridge	Councillor	Unsure	I'm not sure public transportation in Ingersoll is a realistic endeavor. I would like to see transportation to Woodstock happen, even if only a twice a day route. For example leaving Ingersoll at 9:00 am and 1:00 pm, and returning 1:00pm and 5:00 pm. This could happen with an existing Woodstock line, where twice a day it is extended to Ingersoll. It is possible that a pilot project of 3 to 6 months could determine if it is cost effective-enough people using it.
Tammy Jeffrey- Larder	Councillor	Unsure	This is something that is important to many seniors and needs to be addressed. A committee could be put together to do some research on what is available and at what cost.
Gordon Lesser	Councillor	Yes	I have answered yes to public transport because it is something that in Ingersoll we could certainly use. The big difficulty I see right now is number of users. Our population does not right now have the numbers to support a traditional bus service. So we need to find an alternate method that the province will also support. To go it alone is a large financial burden that is to big for most small communities to handle. So I will keep talking to the appropriate ministers to try to find a solution.
Becci Verbrugge	Councillor	Unsure	I believe there is a need for affordable public transportation in our town. Looking into bylaws, funding and best possible scenarios for our town is where to start

Eric Berridge	Councillor	I would like to see more social services in Ingersoll, and less people having to go to Woodstock. I would like a storefront social services worker on Thames Street to help those with mental illness, anxiety and addiction issues. I believe people would use these services more if they were right in town.

Gordon Lesser	Councillor	I feel that a county wide forum on housing with the developers to find out what they need to build more throughout the county would be a good start. We can come up with all the plane we want but if noone wants to build affordable housing it gets us nowhere, the other area to look at is youth especially teenagers. Youth centers are helpful but if they are easily to get to especially if you are in a rural area we as a community lose. This will require a commitment from all the municipalities in Oxford not just the three larger urban centers.
